The Problem: Scarcity Leadership

As Kurumbuka co-founder, Phocas Ngendahayo, says: "Growing up as a refugee and losing family members in the 1994 Genocide against the Tutsi, I experienced what toxic leaders are capable of violence, corruption, and exploitation. But I have also experienced what visionary Christ-centered leaders can do – promote reconciliation, create economic opportunities, and serve marginalized communities. I deeply believe that local Christian leaders with an abundant mentality will not only prevent future tragedies, but they will unleash the potential of our beautiful continent."

Communities across Africa have faced decades of poor leadership rooted in a scarcity mentality. From a long history of colonial abuse to modern-day government corruption, the leadership modeled to many has been a scarcity-minded, me-first approach, where leaders take advantage of the citizens and resources in their care. This has led to poverty, marginalization, and division.

Many outside organizations and mission agencies have invested billions to solve the challenges resulting from bad leadership but struggled to produce longterm results. This is because the solutions were not generated by empowered local leaders and local communities. When missionaries and aid agencies left, their solutions left with them.

The Solution: Abundant Leadership

At Kurumbuka, we believe real change, effective change, comes from leaders within Africa. Our goal is to provide marginalized communities with local Christian leaders who can identify abundant potential and bring lasting solutions for their challenges.

We do this in four steps:

- Developing an individual leader
- **Connecting** them to a network of leaders 10
- **Equipping** them to multiply local solutions in 888 their community
- **Empowering** them to realize their dreams for (\mathbf{F}) their country and continent.

We equip today's leaders through our Abundant Leadership Institute to make an immediate impact for the most vulnerable while **developing tomorrow's** leaders through Trek to be a community of Christcentered, abundant, and service-oriented leaders for the future of their continent.

Multiplication from the Margins

Our Kurumbuka community is committed to developing and empowering African leaders.

What we do at Kurumbuka seems simple, but it has a profound impact:

- 1. Go to the margins.
- 2. Find faithful leaders.
- 3. Invest in what God is doing through them.
- 4. Help those leaders multiply impact in their community.
- 5. Invite partners to join us.
- 6. Repeat.

We love investing in Christian leaders who share Jesus' love with communities on the margins because it has a significant ripple effect.

Why do we go to the margins?

We have been conditioned to believe change starts from the center, that it is driven by people and networks of power, influence, and wealth but at Kurumbuka, we believe Jesus has a different model: Lasting change starts from the margins.

God chose the humble way of the manger, the carpenter, the fishermen, and the cross to transform broken humanity. In God's economy, an offering of 5 loaves and 2 fishes multiplies, overflowing baskets of food. Uganda Bishop and Theologian Dr. David Zac Niringiye said it well: "God is often working most powerfully far from the center."

Kurumbuka seeks out leaders in Africa who are already working to bring Jesus' hope and healing to some of the most marginalized people in the world. They serve in or come from communities that have suffered from conflict, poverty, and injustice. They come from often-overlooked countries like Burundi, Cameroon, the Democratic Republic of the Congo, Ethiopia, Kenya, Rwanda, South Sudan, Tanzania, and Uganda.

Why do we focus on faithful local leaders?

We believe effective change comes from within.

Many generous business-minded people have told me they don't see the point of investing in Africa, that it doesn't work. It's hard to hear this, but I understand the skepticism. Billions of dollars spent on solutions from outside experts have not changed much.

That's why at Kurumbuka, we seek out local Christian leaders who are faithfully working on the margins but face significant barriers and challenges. We also invest in young emerging leaders from disadvantaged backgrounds with high potential. These leaders won't appear in the Time's 100 Most Influential People but are truly changing their countries.

They are leaders like:

- Yohannes and Cara Yadagne (ALI Cohort 8) with Hiwat Ministries. They are reaching thousands of people in Ethiopia with the gospel and bringing reconciliation in war-torn areas on a shoestring budget.
- Kristen Nicholas Nzungu (ALI Cohort 11) with Voice of Hope Radio in Burundi. He reaches tens of thousands of Burundians with his evangelism and discipleship programs.

 A young man named Keintin (Trek Cohort 2), who grew up in a refugee camp, attended our Trek program and is now pursuing a business degree at university so he can go back and help his people.
Hundreds of people like you in North America and Africa are making a big difference through generous giving, prayer, recommending and training leaders, and volunteering to host events. Your partnership makes our work possible.

With your help, we have invested deeply over the past four years in **222** established Christian leaders like Yohannes, Cara, and Kristen in 9 countries who are working on the margins. We have also invested in **40** emerging leaders like Keintin. We do this primarily through our **Abundant Leader-ship Institute** and our **Trek** program. How we help leaders multiply impact in their community:

We have worked with leaders in ALI and Trek to train over 1,000 other community leaders using our online platforms and resources and an asset-based approach. Through a partnership with a local organization called Youth Impact Mission, we invest in approximately 4,000 student leaders each year who impact 70,000 secondary students in 300 schools across Rwanda and Burundi. We seek to multiply everything we do through leaders who understand their local context and are committed to their community long-term.

The Abundant Leadership Institute

Leaders serving anywhere in Africa are invited to join the Abundant Leadership Institute (ALI). Through this one-year advanced leadership certificate program, leaders tackling some of the most daunting challenges in the world, like marginalization, ethnic conflict, and poverty, are equipped to address the root cause, scarcity leadership. These leaders are empowered to lead their teams and communities and bring lasting solutions that are locally grown and sustainable.

ALI is accredited by Trinity Western University (TWU), and provides graduates from our Academic Stream opportunities for further education through TWU's Masters in Leadership.

Trek

Emerging Leaders

Africa has the most youthful population in the world (meaning it has the lowest average age). By choosing to invest in Africa's emerging leaders, you are choosing to invest in the development of the next generation of godly leaders; the ones who will help shape the future of their continent.

Through our program for emerging leaders, we develop and work. empower young people to live fully and freely as followers of Jesus. This is accomplished by knowing self, others, and God, Trek equips young visionaries to make a meaningful impact in and by growing in discipleship, leadership, citizenship, and their home community and in their country as future leaders. stewardship.

Trek

East African youth ages 18-23, high school graduates or equivalent, are invited to join Trek's transformative leadership program.

Trek develops character, skills, and faith through experien-

tial learning, service projects, and mentorship. Through an intensive three-month program, young people build strong friendships through intentional community while living at the Kurumbuka Leadership Hub, engage in immersive learning experiences across Rwanda's stunning landscapes, grow in their faith and understanding of God, and build a wide net-

Choosing Abundance

Raan Clement South Sudan | ALI Cohort 9

"In 2010, I was chosen for a peacebuilding training in Switzerland, put on by the British Council of Switzerland, for young leaders from conflict-affected countries around the world. Near the end of the training, some of the students from other African countries came to me and said that **they were planning to walk out of the hotel and disappear into Europe instead of returning to the challenges of Africa.** They asked me to join them.

I told them...

I grew up in a grass-thatched house in a remote village without running water or electricity. No matter how glittering Europe is, it doesn't please me because I don't see my contribution in it. I am going back to South Sudan to make my contribution to a better future for my children and the greatgrandchildren of my country.

I know I will not make a huge difference that will immediately make my country look like Europe. **Still, I want to be among those who will lay the foundation for a better future.** Our forefathers did their part; it is now our turn, and we all have to continue to do our work wherever we are called. Today, each of those leaders who were on the verge of giving up are still serving in their home countries."

Being called does not mean that it is easy, that we don't think about giving up, or that glittering options don't tempt us. Sometimes, we try to justify or rationalize that, really, God has asked enough of us already, and it's someone else's turn.

Raan works as the Outreach and Learning Manager with the Conflict Sensitivity Resource Facility (CSRF). CSRF is a joint venture of two international peacebuilding organizations, Saferworld and Swisspeace, based in London and Basel. At the Conflict Sensitivity Resource Facility, his team helps educate aid organizations on delivering aid without causing or exacerbating conflict and tensions.

Aid organizations are also overwhelmed by the complexity of the situation, particularly when long-standing local conflicts are mixed with poverty. Imagine this scenario, which Raan sees regularly: **Communities A and B have real needs, and people are dying.** An aid organization wants to help but only



has the capacity to support one group, so they focus on Community A. Community B is angry and attacks Community A to take those resources...so **the well-intentioned aid escalates the conflict.**

Raan attended the Abundant Leadership Institute with Kurumbuka and returned with a fresh determination to seek hope. "I am so grateful to Kurumbuka for all the learning. I need to continue to learn more about leadership.

My supervisor said that she's seen a lot of changes in how I conduct myself, and I know it's because of what I learned from Kurumbuka. I work with a team that provides training for donor organizations providing aid and a team researching conflict sensitivity. We are influencing how aid is delivered across our country."

An Abundant Leadership mindset makes all the difference. "I'm a peace-builder by career, and the Kurumbuka training built on my studies. Shifting from a scarcity mindset to an abundant mindset was so powerful. People are so dependent on aid that they forget they are rich in resources that the aid organizations are not bringing."

Raan says, "When aid actors fill the government's gaps with health services or education on a permanent basis, that continuous pumping of resources shifts the responsibility from the government to the organizations. This is the biggest disease we can have from aid. Aid should only bridge temporary gaps, not replace the local government's responsibility."

When we see South Sudan on the news, the pictures and stories portray a bleak situation for one of the poorest countries on earth. But from Raan's perspective, "whatever goes into the news about South Sudan is driven by the interest of getting aid money. It portrays suffering and misery. But they don't report the hope. There is a lot of abundance that people forget to talk about. There is a better future ahead of us."

"The future needs to be made by us in the forefront, with the aid actors behind us, giving us a little energy when we need it most.

Change will come, but it has to be driven by the South Sudanese.

I haven't lost hope because of my faith. What we see today will soon be history, and things will change."

"For me, this is home. All we need is technical knowledge. We may not realize this in our lifetime, but our children will see the difference. It is our turn to make the sacrifices, and we should not shy away from that."

Raan's prayer requests: to have good health to continue my work, a peaceful environment without conflict, and to make more progress in building a future for my country and community



Empowering Solutions

and farm in addition to partnering with community members to build marketplaces for people to gather, sell goods, build relationships, and share knowledge, ultimately building a thriving local economy. As Kinvest piloted economic initiatives, the team recognized the critical role of local leaders. Peace was hired to build a leadership development program that would catalyze every area of Kinvest's work.

Peace dove in headfirst. Even as COVID-19-related



disruptions swept across the country, Peace found creative ways to engage, challenge, and train leaders.

Yet, over time, Peace became increasingly aware of the overwhelming needs in rural communities. She wondered, "Will Kinvest ever have enough resources to help all of these people? Will I have the right solutions?"

Peace started to spiral into a scarcity mentality, focusing on the roadblocks and lack of resources. After previously finding creative ways to develop the leadership team within Kinvest, Peace hit a dead end and succumbed to the scarcity mentality of not having what it would take to help Kinvest build thriving local communities. She felt lost, depleted from giving and ultimately in need of help. This is when Peace was introduced to Kurumbuka and was accepted into the Abundant Leadership Institute.

ALI's first module on developing an abundant mentality challenged Peace to her core. She says, "I realized that I had a scarcity mindset that had trapped me...

My 'giving syndrome' prevented me from seeing that the people I work with actually have solutions."

It took Peace two months of continual self-assessment to realize that her scarcity mindset was influencing every decision she made. Simultaneously, ALI was equipping her with a new mindset.

"Adopting an abundant mindset changed my life completely. It removed the burden I had to solve every problem I saw. Now, I empower the people I work with to realize their own solutions."

Suddenly, leadership became simple. Peace returned to her work with renewed vigour and clarity. She sought to empower instead of fix. **She saw the abundance in rural communities instead of the scarcity.** Her new mindset quickly spread throughout her team and, ultimately, to the villages where Kinvest serves.

Last year, 350 community members in 30 villages participated in Kinvest's leadership development program. Peace's investment is helping create generational economic change through local ownership and provided community members with more jobs, food, positive community networks, and enough capital to send their kids to school.

By serving as an agent for transformation, Peace is seeing her impact 'kurumbuka' (meaning 'multiply') in every area of her life. Inspired by her ALI experience, Peace has a new dream: "to empower catalytic leaders wherever I serve to create a generational impact that will endure long after I'm gone."

Peace's prayer requests: "1) that the Lord in his infinite grace provides resources to abundantly flow into these communities, enabling them to continue their vital work with even greater impact and effectiveness, 2) that the Lord will sustain all community champions and renew them each day as they pour out their love and compassion for others."

Peace Bureshyo was 12 when her family moved to Rwanda. Her grandmother had described their homeland as a country flowing with milk and honey, but after crossing the border, Peace had to shield her eyes from the bones strewn along the road.

It was 1994. Two months earlier, approximately 1 million Rwandans were murdered in the Genocide Against the Tutsi. **Peace's family had been living in Uganda as refugees, but they returned to Rwanda to help their nation rebuild.**

Rwanda has rapidly developed since the devastation of genocide three decades ago, but despite its growth there is large disparity between urban development and rural development, where most Rwandans still live as subsistence farmers.

Resettling was hard for Peace, but her mother regularly challenged her, **"What are you going to do to help carry our country to another level?"**

Peace was determined to help others by solving the problems she saw around her. After initially pursuing a career in healthcare, Peace discovered a passion for fixing inner problems that prevented people from reaching their potential. She says, "I wanted to solve as many problems as possible so people could enjoy the lives that God had given them."

Peace began working for – and eventually leading – the HR department at a local bank. She completed her MBA and earned a certificate in coaching. Her team became more effective through staff development and training, and Peace became an experienced problem solver. After ten years, Peace was ready for a new challenge, and God opened a door.

In 2020, Peace was invited to join Kinvest Impact Foundation, a start-up NGO working to help rural African communities develop by empowering rural entrepreneurs to learn, develop,



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Discovering Purpose

Andrew Ssentongo Uganda | Trek Cohort 2

"I thought life was about academic excellence and me. I was so selfish that I was not bothered about other people's concerns and needs. I was full of selfish desires, unforgiveness, comparisons, and self-doubt. But God had a plan for me," says Andrew.

That plan included the next step: joining the Trek program at the Kurumbuka Leadership Hub. He says, "I was so touched by courses like Keys to Freedom, Lead Like Jesus, God's Will, and Self-Leadership. Through Trek, I got to connect more with God, and my life changed."

During Trek, for the first time, Andrew really thought about why God created him.

"I found God speaking so much into my life, especially about other young people. So many are affected by HIV, teen pregnancy, and other challenges. They need someone to talk to. I realized that I needed to do something, so I started a program called Teens Talk to advise teens on how to make better choices and help them with resources to stay in school."

If you've been part of a startup organization, you'll know it is not easy, especially for a teenager. "Most of the funds are from my own pockets," says Andrew. "I believe that if I can provide even three packets of sanitary pads or a few notebooks for a young girl, I can help her continue with school.

If God was so good to me, helping me become who I am today, it's also good for me to give back the little I have.



That's how God can use me to build his kingdom."

Andrew is studying in the evenings and on weekends to become a medical laboratory technician and volunteering at a hospital in Masaka, Uganda, to gain experience. As the youngest of five with a single mom, poverty prevented him from studying until he won scholarships to attend primary and secondary school.

As he says, "Kurumbuka saw something in me, when Uncle Mike Richardson met me. Then Uncle Sam (Birondwa) and Uncle Denis (Akandwanaho) called me. God and our leaders had a plan for me before I knew."

"Many people I know don't have hope - to go to school, to get a job, to be someone in life," says Andrew. "I realized that my story can be another person's solution, and God needs to use it to benefit others."

"It's through Trek that I was able to realize the potential of what I can do for God. I am so proud to be part of the Kurumbuka family."

Andrew's Prayer Requests: "pray that God will use me for what he wants me to do. Pray for the young people of Africa living without hope because I came from that life, and if it wasn't for God's grace to put these leaders in my life, I don't know where I would be now. They gave, for my sake."


